The younger students had classes, games, and skits all focusing on the theme: "His banner over me is love." The older kids (Jr. High and High School) are studying "Who am I in Christ?"

We are thankful that God has protected us in each camp. We praise Him for the fruits of the Spirit being planted in each child.



12th Grade Community Project - Las Garzas

Sharing God's love with our neighbors

Our 12th graders are organizing a community project. In the neighborhood where we live (Las Garzas, San Antonio). Each year the project is in a different place. Our school community works to make funds to provide gifts, food, clothing, shoes or school supplies for children in these neighborhoods.

This year we are working with kids at the Quinta Adonai. Once a month our 12th graders reach out to the community with a megaphone and house-to-house invitations for a children's program. Last week 60 kids (and about 30 adults) came to hear God's word. Many of these kids heard the plan of Salvation for the first time. Praise God!

School starts and Dengue continues

Since February we have been battling mosquitoes, especially ones that transmit Dengue - The bone breaking disease. Many students and teachers have been absent for days, some have been hospitalized. This disease causes fever and people say that it feels as if your bones are breaking.

Please pray for the health of our staff and students. We have 270 students enrolled. Every day we have the opportunity to share God's word and reach out to our students, offering prayers and counselling both to the students and their parents. We are off to a good start and we expect huge blessings the rest of the school year.

What led me to Colegio Adonai.

I always wanted my son to go to a good school. I did not know where. It took me so long to decide. I asked a lot of people, until one day I asked God to show me where he wanted my son to be. While traveling in public transportation I saw a sign that said a lot of things, but what caught my eyes was the phrase: "Educating with Christian values". Until then, no school had offered me that. I knew the love of God and knew how important that was in these times. I contacted the School. I enrolled my son and to this day God is slowly working in my life. After four years of hard work, today I received Jesus into my heart as Lord and Savior, and I cannot turn away from him. As usual, there are every day struggles but everything is easier in Christ.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Over the last several months since Christmas new mayors were elected into office. Some of those mayors chose not to honor the long held tradition/“contract” of paying one month’s salary for each boy they send to live at the home. Forty percent of the income for the orphanage’s budget has come from the mayors’ offices and the other 60% comes from North America. As a result, the orphanage took the position that if the mayors will not pay, they cannot keep the children. It was a mutually agreed upon decision, and over 10 children were sent back to the cities where they came from.

The government is actively/proactively seeking to close orphanages. They have enacted laws and changed the structure of the existing homes in an effort to move towards a foster care system, such as we have here in the States.

Anyone here will tell you that the foster care systems has its own flaws and difficulties, and we whole heartedly agree. We wish there was no such thing as an orphanage, but from a practical standpoint there will always be a need for temporary homes/orphanages. When we visited last year we discussed this at great length with the leadership. The orphanage needed to move in the direction of homes with 10 children and get away from an institution situation, in compliance with the law. We also felt this would be in the best interests of the children overall, and we hoped to make a smooth transition. In the six months since we visited, not much had changed in this regard until January. At this point, the orphanage felt they needed to take this mutually agreed upon position to send some of the kids back to their cities.



The orphanage leadership has been working with the city officials more closely, and they have now come to an agreement that they will only take in new kids who are from the city of Nepo. The city has agreed to provide a psychologist, a social worker and a lawyer for the orphanage as well. The number of kids today is down to 15, but they are open to taking in kids as needed, and in the meantime they are restructuring and hoping to put a good plan in place to build upward from this point.

However, within the last three months their expenses spiraled out of control and they got behind on their bills. I believe it was more than 3 months that the mayors had not paid, but they had expected them to pay late (as usual) and so they were not alarmed, but nor did they prepare as they might have had they foreseen the outcome. The Brazilian churches have stepped up their giving and often this means sacrificial giving on their part. We are thankful for this ministry leadership that for so many years has overseen and cared for the orphanage in personal ways. They have encouraged people and communities to support the orphanage. They have food drives for the orphanage in which one month they will encourage donations of oil for cooking, and whatever they gather someone will bring that to the orphanage that month. The next month will be flour, etc. They bring toilet paper and bigger items when they rent a bus to come for holidays or Carnival or Kids Day, etc. We have appreciated the support and help they have provided as well as the leadership in overseeing the orphanage.

The previous budget for 30 children was \$8000 a month, and 40% of that went to pay workers’ salaries. The workers

receive a basic salary for the most part, and they work here out of love, but even so it is a huge expense. The orphanage has been seeking to cut costs wherever they can. Last month they let go two of the workers (one of the laundry ladies and another kitchen helper) in an effort to bring the costs down. They have decided to rent out the land in order to not incur more farming costs at this time and concentrate on the transition changes. They do have a need for a new van which we were hoping to buy this summer. They feel a 16-passenger van would be the most practical and economical. The van will cost approximately \$25,000, and so far we have collected \$7,000.

We have been very glad to hear in the voices of the workers that they are not discouraged. They had briefly mentioned the possibility of closing the orphanage, and they have affirmed that they believe it is the Lord's orphanage, and He is keeping it open. We are so glad to hear this. Even during these times of change, we know that the children need a safe place to go. We can testify that children today are coming to the orphanages from very difficult family situations, and their emotional scars are much deeper than anything we had seen 25 years ago. The breakdown in the family is so much deeper than before, in my opinion. I am thankful there are people willing to serve in this way. They are not perfect people, but they serve and give the best they have. We are excited that Katy Pavkov, a teacher from Pennsylvania who was there for six months last year, is eagerly hoping to go back soon and serve for 2 years as soon as her visa is approved. She will be a big help during this time when they are cutting costs and

making ends meet and stretching themselves. She will not add to the budget either J, but more than that, she will be an encouragement, and she loves these boys.

We appreciate your faithful prayers for the orphanage and this ministry's needs more than we can say. Please continue to keep them in your prayers faithfully.

One week she arrived at the Bible study saying" I feel a burden lifted off of me today." When asked what had happened, she said she had gotten rid of the idol-- saint Jude, from her bedroom. Some time back she had been told that if you lack money, just burn a green candle in front of this saint night and day, and you'll never be short of money. She found out it didn't work, and one of the sisters shared with her that our God is a jealous God and doesn't

share His glory with any man-made idol. She felt so relieved to have gotten the idol out of her home. We covet your prayers for Maria, her daughter Viririana, and other family members and friends they are bringing..that they can have a true repentance, conversion, and that their lives will glorify the Lord Jesus.

HELP GIVE SIGHT TO THE BLIND

SUPPORT THE CHILDREN'S CLINIC OF OPHTHALMOLOGY IN SERBIA

Current State



This eye clinic serves the region of Serbia, Montenegro, Bosnia & Herzegovina. Annually, approximately 20,000 children are turned away from the clinic as conditions only allow for up to 5,000 partial surgeries a year. Many children struggle to sleep after surgery as the clinic has issues with roof leaks, cockroaches, and various bugs.

Goal/Go Forward Plan

The main goal is to raise enough funds so that the floors and walls can be covered with ceramic tiles, broken and rusted beds and sanitary equipments replaced, and new mattresses and bed sheets purchased. The work will be done by hiring local Nazarean brethren under the supervision of the certified architect and the hospital's Technical Director. Surplus funds will go towards the purchase of new medical equipment. Funds will not be directly given to the clinic in order to ensure accountability.

Argentina

We are happy to share news from the Lord’s work in Baradero, Argentina. It first started as an outreach in one of the poorest neighborhoods here, more than 5 years ago. Though the context is hard and even dangerous at times, the Lord is blessing us very richly. Ministerio Luz en las Tinieblas keeps growing. Since July 2012 we became the second INAC (ACC) church in Baradero.

We already have 26 members, and a regular attendance of 50 to 60 people, being in charge of it Pastor Jose Pascal. We have already held three baptisms in the last two years. In addition, the work with the children is growing too. We have about 30 kids each week.

We have been using a wooden shed to hold the meetings, but we will have to leave it by next August, since it is a borrowed space, and now the owner is claiming it back.

As the Lord never leaves his children alone, He gave us the possibility to buy a piece of property nearby to build the new church. Last week the construction work began, and the foundations are being built. What is Important?

Is it your present physical condition? Is it your family, spouse or children? Is it providing for those you love? Is it maintaining a “good” image at home, at work or at play? Is it your financial condition or position? What is it that controls your thoughts? This letter comes as a challenge that you may not have considered seriously. The previous questions and others similar to them are such that we each encounter on a daily basis and the decisions that we make indicate what we think are important. And above all, what we consider to be important is the most important question of all!

I am writing this as a challenge to all that you hold dear because we are a product of what we have learned and consider to be true. Most of you are a “believer” and have accepted salvation by the sacrifice of Jesus’ blood to cover your sin. My desire is that you understand fully who GOD is and truly make Him most important in your life! We in North America have been fed lies to the point that the believing of some of them is common even in the church. One of the most insidious is that we are the “master of our own destiny”! If we are the master, who is GOD? My GOD is the master of my destiny! Consider Jeremiah 17:5 & 6, “Thus saith the LORD; Cursed be the man that trusteth in man, and maketh flesh his arm, and whose heart departeth from the LORD. For he shall be like the heath in the desert, and shall not see when good cometh; but shall inhabit the parched places in the wilderness, in a salt land and not inhabited”. Ads and the media encourage us to “do your own thing”. What does God’s Word say? I find that it says that if I do my own thing I will surely come to ruin. And why is that? It is because our creator GOD has made us in a certain way that is difficult to understand. We are complex creatures who have the capacity to reason and choose. And what you choose determines your eternal destiny.

So, now comes the part that is important and difficult. “Seeing that these things are true, how should we then live?” In order to encourage the choices that are pleasing to GOD, I now refer to some passages from the Bible. The first of which is I Timothy 6:7 “For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out.” The second is a command that Jesus gave in Matthew 28:19 & 20; “Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the

Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world.” So, I have a choice, am I going to do what I want, or what He tells me to do?

Here comes the reason why this article is in the ACCF Missionary Newsletter: As a member of the Missionary Committee for many years, I have observed that there have been fewer applications for service in recent years. We know that for many of you, faithfully praying and giving financially to our missionaries is important in your life. Not that missionary applications to the ACCFMC is the most accurate indicator of what’s important, but I do wonder if it does portrays a lack of understanding of what is important in life. May we each be faithful to God’s command of spreading the Gospel of Christ! As we die to ourselves and live for Christ as the most important one in this life, His Spirit will lead us into areas of service, perhaps even through one of the ACCF ministries!

In conclusion, here is a statement of my own to ponder, “There is one GOD and it is not me”.

Dear Friends of CLM,

We are thankful for what the Lord has been doing at CLM and look forward to His continued work in and through this ministry. In this article we are concluding the explanation we began two issues ago of the ministry plan we are following here at CLM.

As Brazilian childcare laws have changed to emphasize foster care and adoption, we have been required by the government to hire a psychologist and two social workers to oversee this work. Thankfully, the Lord has also provided a grant from the state government to pay for this expense.

This team is responsible for nearly all the contacts with the children’s families and the courthouse. They visit the family homes of new children who arrive at CLM to evaluate whether or not it is possible for a child to return to the family, or whether there are other extended family members capable of taking care of the child.

Their work with us has contributed to the children’s cases being resolved more quickly, thus allowing them to return to the family of origin or be adopted, without long waiting periods that were typical in the past. This team has also been instrumental in obtaining other grants and in soliciting donations from businesses in the community.

Because cases are being resolved more quickly, there is a higher turnover of children. In the past year, there were 10 children from CLM Entre Rios who were adopted, and nearly 20 in the past 18 months! More than 80 percent of the children currently at CLM Entre Rios arrived since the beginning of 2012.

The makeup of the children at the home is very different than in the past. They are between the ages of 10 and 16, and mostly boys. There are many medical and educational needs, as well as challenging behaviors. We are constantly seeking the Lord’s guidance as to how to best teach them His ways, and we need your prayers.

We are thankful that some of the members of our local church have organized a system of prayer partners, in which members of the church receive a picture of a CLM child and commit to praying for him or her regularly. We would like to stimulate further involvement of our local church in the activities at

CLM by encouraging monthly visits to CLM and encouraging church families to make a practice of inviting CLM children to their homes.

We hope to form a group of volunteers from our local church to come to CLM monthly to help with maintaining the grounds. We would also like to continue building relationships with believing families who are considering adopting, and in this way encourage them to dedicate themselves to the calling of adoption.

One goal we have is for us to work more closely with adoptive families to prepare them for the adoption and work with them after the adoption. Seeing the difficulties faced by CLM missionaries who have adopted has given us greater resolve to provide this support to foster and adoptive families in the future.

We are also working to improve our program for training staff, both current workers and those who may become part of the team in the future. Developing this program is a time-consuming process requiring much research, planning and preparation, as well as discipline in carrying it out. Please pray for the Lord’s direction for us in this effort.

We continue to depend on your interest and support in this ministry. We are hoping to develop a team with a designated CLM supporter in each local church in the U.S. and Canada who will serve CLM by communicating with their congregation. We want to maintain contact with those of you who have been so helpful in the past, and also improve communication where needed. Please let us know if you would be willing to help in this way.

Please continue lifting us in prayer before the Father. We depend on the support God gives us through all of you.
