On this occasion His opponents charged that this was done by the power of Satan, thus blaspheming the Holy Spirit as well as our Lord and our Heavenly Father. He gave them an answer in His wisdom that brought to nothing their charges. He then laid before them the seriousness of their charge because it was through the power of the Spirit that these things had also been done. Let us beware that we **never** fall into this sin. Let us search out in our lesson the ways in which we could fall into such error.

QUARTERLY THEME: Christ - King and Savior

TOPIC: CHRIST, MASTER OF THE STORM

INTRODUCTION:

Occasionally we hear or read of people who, not professing to be Christians, call upon the Lord when they are in danger. They expect Him to deliver them from the storm, but when there is no storm, they have little or no thought for Him. Why is this? Surely they must have some faith in a Higher Power than the storm itself, or they would not seek help. They want help when needed but don't deem it necessary to return gratitude or love. They are independent, indifferent and self-centered. If only they would permit the small bit of faith to grow within their hearts and call upon the Lord always, for everything.

Christ has the power to still the storms, to save the sinner, if he would only permit Him to care for him in trying circumstances, in illness, temptations, misfortunes, etc. If the individual wants this power of Christ, it is up to him to surrender all to Jesus and devotedly become His disciple. Then he knows that whatsoever the circumstance may be, Christ has control over it and will care for the individual, and his heart will be filled with peace.

CENTRAL TRUTH: By His grace and power, Jesus Christ can give peace in the midst of the storms of life.

GOLDEN TEXT: *HE AROSE, AND REBUKED THE WIND, AND SAID UNTO THE SEA, PEACE BE STILL.* Mark 4:39

His disciples were fearful and said: "*What manner of man is this, that even the wind and the sea obey Him?*" When one can realize in faith that this Son of Man is also the Son of God, we can—in measure—understand His power over the elements. For, this man, who was the Word made flesh, had a part in the creation of all things. "*For without Him was not anything made that was made.*" (John 1:3)

How blessed are we if we have taken Him into our "little ship" for our journey over the sea of life. For as surely as the sun shines, we will also experience storms of wind, clouds of despair, waves of doubt and fear and the danger of sinking into unbelief. We could never reach the safe harbor on our own, so it behooves us not to keep our Pilot in the hinder part of our ship, in the background, but to give Him full control of our lives. Then in the troubles, problems and trials of life, we can hear His command—"Peace, be still."

When the waves of doubt assail thee
On life's deep and restless sea,
When the breakers nigh destroy thee
And thou cry: "Ah, woe is me!"
When thy Saviour seems asleep
Heedless of their angry sweep,
Zion, own Him still as Master;
He will save thee from disaster.
