QUARTERLY THEME: Christ - King and Savior

TOPIC: JESUS, LORD OF THE SABBATH

INTRODUCTION:

Jesus' life on this earth was spent in teaching the people concepts of worship that were new or different to them. They had, by the law and by their own traditions, established certain rules of conduct concerning keeping of the Sabbath. This was necessary to point out to the people that this day must be different from the six days of labor. The seventh day is still a different day, except that Jesus showed that we are to serve Him. This involves teaching others about Him, helping those who are in need of help, and other things whereby His name is glorified. He did not change it into a day just like other days, but ordained it into a day of doing good. He demonstrates that He is indeed "Lord of the Sabbath." It is still just as wrong to make it a day of labor except for the necessary things even as it always was. The problem of proper observance of the Lord's day is solved when we devote ourselves to serving God and His purposes.

CENTRAL TRUTH: Jesus as Lord of the Sabbath, elevates the Lord's Day from a day of legal restraint to a day for doing good for the glory of God and the betterment of man.

GOLDEN TEXT: *THE SON OF MAN IS LORD ALSO OF THE SABBATH.*

Mark 2:28

It was hard for some people to recognize Jesus as Lord. It was even more difficult when He taught and did things different than the ceremonial law and their traditions. Thus it was when they observed Him leading His disciples into the grain fields to gather handfuls of grain for them to eat and when He performed acts of physical healing on the Sabbath. Their compassion was greater, He pointed out, for the sheep or oxen that would fall into a ditch than for their fellow man who was bound by Satan.

He not only testified that He was "Lord of the Sabbath" but gave evidence of it by performing these acts of healing. He didn't say we are to mow our lawns, or work in our gardens, paint our houses, etc., but He did teach us to do good and to serve Him. May we devote ourselves to Him and strive to do His will.
