Peter and John, in their great desire for communion with God, were going to the temple to pray when they were asked for money by a helpless, crippled beggar. Like a sin-sick sinner, he needed something. However, instead of what he hoped for, he received an even greater gift: salvation and eternal life. LESSON TEXT: *Act 3:1-26*

LESSON SETTING: At the gate of the temple called Beautiful in Jerusalem.

TIME: Approximately 33 A.D. After Christ returned to the right hand of God.

QUARTERLY THEME: The Early Church

TOPIC: THE FIRST PERSECUTION

INTRODUCTION:

The priests and elders had seen that Jesus was crucified. They were jealous of Him and wanted Him out of the way. But they were not able to do so. Although, He Himself was no longer on earth, His presence in every believer was working miracles and they saw their plan of doing away with Jesus had failed. Here were Peter and John drawing thousands of people to them and the priests and elders imprisoned them. They found no reason for punishing Peter and John, but were boldly told that He whom God had raised from the dead was the very one they had killed and now by His risen power the lame man was made whole. For the present the elders could only command them not to speak or teach in the name of Jesus.

Little did they know what power this name would have among the people.

CENTRAL TRUTH: Christians should be faithful to Christ no matter what the cost may be.

GOLDEN TEXT: *BLESSED ARE YE WHEN MEN SHALL REVILE YOU, AND PERSECUTE YOU, AND SHALL SAY ALL MANNER OF EVIL AGAINST YOU FALSELY, FOR MY SAKE.* Matthew 5:11

Jesus had known that His disciples, who were weak in faith but willing to follow Him would become different men when the Holy Spirit truly controlled them. He knew also that their ministry, even as His, would arouse the anger and opposition of the elders and leaders. He felt the need to encourage them before their time of testing, knowing the Holy Spirit would remind them of His words and help them to be like Him, their teacher, when persecution would arise. So He gave them many other teachings like our golden text. "The disciple is not above his master, nor the servant above his lord. It is enough for the disciple that he be as his master, and the servant as his lord. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebub, how much more shall they call them of his household." (Matthew 10:24-25)

If we would be like Jesus in all things, even in persecution we will also need His example, His Word and His Spirit:

O Deliverer from all bondage.
Jesus Christ, our Saviour dear.
With whom harm, contempt, dishonor,
Bring the joy of heaven near!
We ask not for ease and pleasure
As our portion in this life;
What Thou deemest necessary,
Do while here we bear the strife.
