

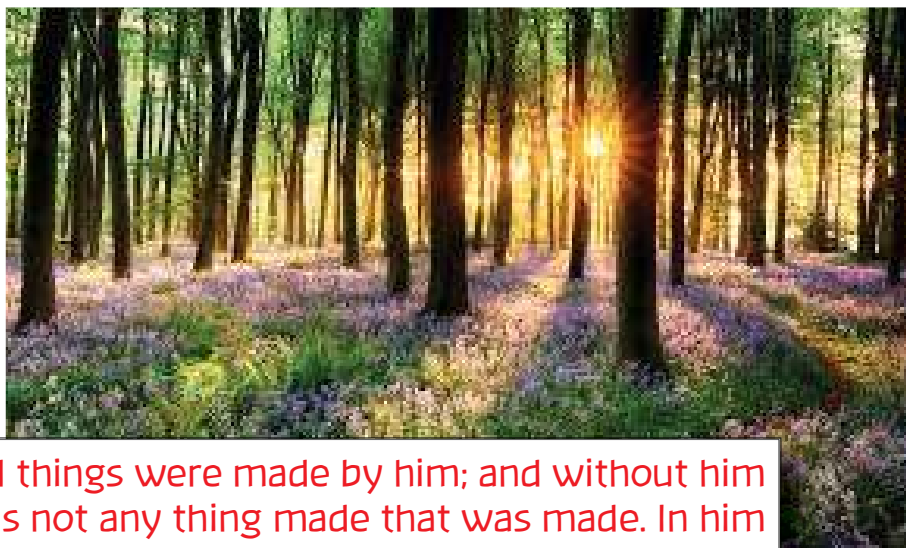

"Teacher Karen", Marcos screamed running into our children's Bible hour and bursting into tears. "You didn't wait for ME to start". I tried to explain to him that it was time to start so we started singing, and now we are going to have our Bible class, but he wasn't happy. He wanted to sing.

I followed him to his class, age 4-7 and we sang two songs with him, calming him down a bit. Funny thing is, he lives exactly in front of our church, not far at all.

When Marcos started coming 3 years ago, he couldn't sit still. He was growing up in a family of 2 brothers and a sister

(now 4 kids), no limits, no rules, and raised by grandma. He interrupted our class, drew attention to himself, and bothered everyone around, often making them cry. He was taken home

several times because of total distraction, but we worked through weekly counseling and visiting, always encouraging him, his mom and his grandma to keep sending him because we really WANT to keep working with him. We assured them that God will be working in his heart. Then, things started changing.

Marcos started sitting a little quieter, he started singing the songs, he memorized his verses, and he retold the stories to his mom. The WORD was revealed and received. God was changing him to the point of him breaking down when worship was started without him.

Our school opened February 12, 2003 with 58 students. God has walked us through these 15 years, raising up new generations for his Kingdom. Some of these students actually started with us since kindergarten. Some participate in local churches, and most of them have a deep understanding of God's word. Now, from Pre-K to 12th grade, there are 340 students. Ninety-five of the 340 students have been granted financial aid from North American churches through scholarships.

FAITH EVANGELICAL MISSION WORLDWIDE REPORT

We pray that this report finds you and your families in a good state of health and well being. We are grateful to the Almighty that He has brought us this far.

Please find below the Mission's report for end of 2017.

HOSPITAL: The hospital continued to experience some liquidity problems due to the rather slow payment of the claims posture of the National Health Insurance Authority. The allocation made to the Hospital out of the last



remittance helped in the settlement of some very long outstanding debts due the pharmaceutical companies. Attendance at the hospital remains strong. There is however a need to develop a new ward on the ground floor to cater to the patients in labor.

OSU CHURCH: Work continues on the office block of the Church. The electrical wiring of the block has been completed. The plastering of the block has also been

started and 33% of the plastering has been completed.

TEMA CHURCH: The work on the ground floor of the church building has started after stacking some building materials. Progress on the construction is expected to be brisk.

NSAWAM CHURCH: Part of the Church premises was wrecked in a rainstorm and repair work has started in earnest.

MANDELA CHURCH: Payment for this property continues. The family is in the process of preparing the ownership documents for the Mission.

KORLE GONNO CHURCH: Construction of the final pillars of the building has been put into place.

SCHOOL: The school continues to perform well. The decorative metal on the walls are now fixed and the grounds of the forecourt have been graded. After the grading, about three quarters of the forecourt has been concreted. The outside of the school has also now been painted.

BROTHER REX'S FUNERAL:

By the grace of God, the Mission has been able to give Brother Rex a befitting burial. Our chief aim in organizing the funeral was to give God the glory He deserves and to bury His servant in a befitting manner. We give glory to God and to all our supporters who helped us in this difficult time.

The government recognized the good works of our Bro. Rex, so the forecourt of the state house was given to us to use and this is where we held the final funeral rites for our brother. The Ghana Police band was also helpful.

We take this opportunity to thank you all in the USA and the church in Canada for your support in prayers and finances. May God bless you all.

Little Hands Orphanage

Going into 2018, we have a lot to reflect on...

Our year was once again filled with many blessings, and also many tears as we said our farewells to more children who moved on to new families. This year, we welcomed 12 more children into our families (as some came, and some left).

Lazar's home went from having 2 brothers and their "Papa", to having 4 kids. Daniel and Natasha went from a family of 5 kids to 9 (due to an emergency call for a temporary home for some children who could no longer be housed at the shelter). The days were filled with diapers and laundry, but we always made sure the emotional needs of the children were met first. All the kids LOVE to sing, so most mornings would begin with breakfast, then praise. Although none of the children had ever been taught any songs before their arrivals, they all quickly started picking up the words and... would always try their best at the melody. The older boys would always learn the quickest, and could be heard throughout the day singing and trying to teach their younger "siblings" to say the proper words to "Jesus, Lover of My Soul", "What a Friend We Have In Jesus", "Jesus Loves Me" and many others. Sometimes, play sessions would abruptly come to an end as Juan (our 6 year old) would exclaim in exasperation, "No Ismael, that is not how the song goes. Please listen to the words, or you won't be getting any candy for a long time".

Some of our kids also began school for the first time, including Juan at the age of 6. In Mexico, they have a rule that your age determines your grade, no matter if you have had prior education or not. Poor Juan... he was going into a grade where most kids already knew the alphabet, numbers, basic addition and subtraction, how to read, write... and he knew none of this. The director ensured us that they had a great team to work with children who were behind. We soon came to learn, that the great team was supposed to be us, the parents. Every day, Juan was sent home with all the uncompleted homework for us to "teach" to him. Although it was difficult, trying to manage hours playing catch-up with his schooling and the rest of the house-hold, by the grace of God, in a mere matter of 3 months, he now knows his alphabet, numbers, basic addition and subtraction, and is starting to sound

words out on his way to reading. Lazar's kids all arrived "behind" in their schooling as well, but thankfully are still in pre-school.

Lazar has been diligently working with them in regards to their numbers and letters, and they are blossoming. They all really enjoy school, and we look forward to, hopefully, seeing good results in the future once they are more caught-up.

One huge blessing we are looking forward to in 2018, Lord-willing, is having Sis. Rebecca Florica (from Harrow) joining us as a care-giver. Her help will be greatly appreciated, and she is a natural with all the kids. She may be coming later in the year, depending on the timing of her visa approval. We pray all will go smoothly with her transition and the move! It will be great having her. On another note, we also will be starting construction later on in the year, as God provides the funds! We are SO GRATEFUL, beyond words, to each of you who have supported us thus far, and those who continue to give, not only towards the monthly expenses, but now also towards the construction of a new home. Really... we don't have enough words to say thank you. Already, 70% of the funds have been collected towards the total needed for the new building project! That is incredible! We know none of it would be possible without God working through each of you, so, thank you! We will continue to keep you all updated as the year progresses.

This year, we had a multitude of visitors as well, so much so that it would be impossible to list everyone. Be assured, we appreciated each of you (whether it was for a short-term stay or longer) and the love you poured on our families and our precious kids.

As 2017 came to a close, we realize more and more with each passing year just how precious each day SHOULD be to us. Part of this realization was brought on by 3 of our kids leaving right around Christmas... Years can pass by fleetingly, but if we don't value each day, the year can easily escape us. Looking back on the children we said good-bye to this year (Sebastian, Ivanna, Diana, Gabriel, Mateo, Ismael, and Jacobo), we never think "I wish we would have spent less time with them", but rather, more.

There could have always been more cuddles, more love, more reading, more family outings... Make the most of each day. As we are seeing, we ourselves never can tell from day-to-day who will be here with us or gone tomorrow, but we do know that the memories they will take with them, will be the times that were spent tending to their hearts. And, we can already see that THOSE are the memories GOD uses to reach others... as many of their new families have even expressed to us, that these children have taught them how to pray and praise the Lord. May we each value what God has given us today, for we never know what tomorrow will hold! And, we pray many blessings on each of you for what lies ahead in 2018! Be blessed! And thank you again for your constant love and support.

We would like to share about one of our boys, Gustavo. He is 16, likes to make friends, talk, ride his bike, watch movies, and play video games, all-in-all a typical teen.

Gustavo is the only boy here who is not from Nepomuceno and was an exceptional case that the judge authorized. By last report, his parents do not want to take responsibility for Gustavo and they believe he should stay at Familia Adonai, because if he was with them, he would be using drugs. His parents are separated and both have new families. His older sisters are involved in drug trafficking. It is a very sad scenario, which does not offer a lot of hope for Gustavo. The judge does not seem to be interested in making decisions about his future. Pray for the judge responsible for Gustavo's process, that he will not forget the boy's situation and make the right decisions in regard to his future.

He has a somewhat defiant attitude, and he has made some bad choices in the past. Gustavo was baptized in 2016, but is in need of continued discipleship and mentoring. At times, he shows an interest in the things of God, but there appears to be a real apathy to his faith.

1. Pray that he will desire to know God more and seek after the things of Him.
2. Pray for a strengthening of his faith.
3. Pray that Gustavo would recognize God's love for him and that no bitterness would grow because of his parents' neglect.

Happy 2018 from all of us at Lifesong Harmony School!

Unfortunately, 2018 already proves to be challenging, as there is a severe Cholera outbreak in Zambia. Sadly, many are sick and some have died, as a result. The school was scheduled to open in the middle of January, but we had no choice, but to extend the opening by a week. To those of you who may not be familiar with this type of disease, Cholera is a potentially fatal (if left untreated) bacterial infection that is caused by contaminated water and food. Poor sanitation, crowding, and famine are some of the reasons Cholera is still a threat in some parts of the world. Please pray that the staff and students at the school are safe, and for the Chipata Community (the compound where most of our students live) at large.

However, not all news at the start of 2018 is bad. We are thrilled to be able to welcome back our Grade 7 students, to continue on to Grade 8. Let me back up a bit so that I can explain. From its inception, Lifesong Harmony School could only provide the community with a primary education – meaning that the school only went up to Grade 7. After our students graduated from Grade 7, they had no way of continuing to go to school. As a staff and ministry, we were burdened by the idea that the kids would be faced with the same obstacles that they started out with... no means by which to go to school. No child should be denied the right to go to school, so now that the high school is opened, we can continue to provide our students with the education that they so desperately need.

In other news, the library at the school is being used! Thanks to all who participated in getting books out to that part of the world – we currently have approximately 5000 books. It's amazing to see the children enjoying something that is taken for granted in other parts of the world.

We are excited to announce that 25 girls have been selected to board at Lifesong Harmony Home! Each little one comes from a difficult home environment, so the idea of being able to provide for them in this way is remarkable. Poverty is a huge obstacle that

the students face (Chipata Compound

is one of the poorest areas in Kitwe) and that often leads to a host of other problems. Despite the families' desire to be able to provide the best for their children, many are unable to.

The high school washrooms are finally completed! Without the washrooms, the Ministry of Education would not have given approval for the high school. Dennis and Kenneth have decided that they would only build as they need. So, we opened up two grade 8 classrooms this year, and God willing, we will continue to open two classrooms each year until the whole high school is completed. We came across a quote which says, "He who opens a school door, closes a prison". We hope and pray that rings true in all of the lives at Lifesong Harmony School.

Finally, and most importantly, we have had children approaching our leadership asking about baptism. The children meet weekly to discuss the bible at chapel, and there are devotions done daily in each class. We are grateful to God to witness the changing of hearts....perhaps even potential future leaders of Zambia, with a Christ-centered worldview.

Canaan Land Ministries

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

God has done so many things for us in the past few months! We would like to share some of these things, as well as prayer requests, so you know how to support Canaan Land Ministries (CLM) in prayer.

At the beginning of November, we received a new girl, age 16, named Patrícia. We are still getting to know her and her needs. Please pray that she will open her heart to receive God's love and healing.

In December, we were blessed with many events, visitors, and donations of Christmas presents for the kids. The first visitor was Viktória Fulop, who arrived at the beginning of December and stayed with us for nearly a month. Viktória is a missionary from Hungary who spent many years at CLM before moving on to work with PAZ in northern Brazil. In addition to meeting with old and new friends here, she was able to give her testimony and share God's Word with the whole CLM family at a special gathering held at Mary's house. On this day, she showed many pictures of the place she now lives and the people who live and work there. She also taught the kids to make Christmas cookies which were then served at CLM's Christmas gatherings.

Shortly after Viktória arrived, Raquel arrived to stay. Raquel is a missionary from the state of Goiás, in central Brazil. After spending her vacation time at CLM during the past two years, she felt God calling her to come to serve as a long-term missionary at CLM. She is helping in the office on weekdays and helping with the kids on weekends.

Just before Christmas, Dr. Chuck arrived for his annual visit, this time with his granddaughter Annabelle. As is his custom, he led strategic planning meetings with the leadership team. He also met with the caregivers to help identify problems and propose solutions. While he was in meetings with CLM team members, Anna was able to get to know the CLM family, learn some Portuguese, and make new friends.

CLM had several Christmas gatherings. On Christmas Eve, all the families got together for the traditional Brazilian Christmas Eve dinner. Each family contributed a dish, and we were able to pray, fellowship and dine together. On Christmas morning, we had our traditional breakfast of sugary cereals. After breakfast, we went upstairs to the family room and found the presents under the Christmas tree. One by one, each child, caregiver and member of the leadership team opened their presents with the help

of a friend of their choosing. We were grateful to have the presents donated by the AC church in Utinga, São Paulo, as well as members of the community of Entre Rios, who have faithfully served CLM in this way for decades!



On the night after Christmas, we all received the new CLM t-shirt, emblazoned with Jeremiah 29:11: "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the LORD, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end." We all put on our new shirts and took the group picture for this year. After the picture, we all headed to a high-end pizza restaurant in the colony (Paulistana Pizza Bar), which opened its doors to us to donate an evening of pizzas for all the kids, employees and volunteers. It was a very special evening and everyone was very thankful for the dedication of the owners and their employees who served us with the best quality pizzas they had. But in the end, they thanked us, saying they could see that what was just an everyday event for them, ended up being very meaningful for CLM. They also praised and publicized CLM's work on social media, leading to greater visibility and respect for CLM's work among their clients.

On December 29, Mary and Marilda organized a dinner with the adult children of CLM (CLM Plus) in a rented room in the colony. It was very good to see the grown CLM children with their families. There was lots of conversation, reminiscing about the past, and updating one another about their lives now. Viktória, Bethany, and Mary were happy to be able to spend some time with those they took care of as little children.

organized a Bible study competition between the houses, a dinner in which everyone had to go with their clothes inside out to remind us that we are not to be conformed to this world, a 4-day Vacation Bible School, and outdoor activities. Everyone had a lot of fun while learning more about God's Word. Vivi's son Pedro had never been to CLM and was sad to leave. He made many friendships and had a lot of fun with the CLM kids.

During January and February, Mary Gibson and her son Todd and grandson Nicolas have been in the States and have been able to talk

Monthly giving increased some at the end of 2017, but we still have a long way to go to get to a level that will meet CLM's monthly needs on a long-term basis. Lord willing, two of the CLM Board Members will be spending time at Eastern Camp in July, to talk with more of you regarding CLM and how the Apostolic Christian Church in the U.S. and Canada can continue to make a difference in the ministry of CLM.

We enter February with hope that God will continue to bless and guide this ministry. Please pray for the CLM kids as they are returning to school in mid-February, after their summer break. Pray for the caregivers, for strength and wisdom for their daily tasks of ministering to children from difficult places. Pray for the leadership team, as we provide support and direction for the daily activities of CLM. May God be glorified in all we do!

January, 2018

At the beginning of this New Year, the Lord gave us the verse: *"May God arise, may His enemies be scattered, may His foes flee before Him."* Psalm 68:1.

Our faith is in our Mighty God, to fight battles for us in every circumstance we face at our ages of 84 and 87 years!

We cannot believe how quickly 2017 went by, but will now share some of our ministry events with you.

Victor made one more trip to PNG in March for a short visit to update world events for church leaders who don't have the access to news as we do. Realizing that this may be his final PNG visit ever, they gave "Papa Abraham", as they call him, a very touching "goodbye" poster which we now have in our office. The Scripture included, is Hebrews 1:7-8 & 1 Thess. 4:17. A part of the personal message reads: "There's a hole in our hearts that tears cannot mend. but we know there's a reason why we have to say 'Goodbye'." Meanwhile, we can have ongoing involvement by phone or email, while Bro. Willie Ritzmann is doing a fantastic job of taking over from us with supervision & support, along with love & commitment.

In April, we were again blessed to assist in presenting a Passover meal for any interested in the Cairns Community, with good participation and appreciation.

In May & June, we traveled to Israel to participate in a Reconciliation Conference of Jews & Christians, as well as to attend the ICEJ Director's meeting. We also assisted Pst. Peter Harut from PNG to attend the meeting, as the ICEJ leadership wanted to confirm his replacement as PNG ICEJ Director, due to the loss of former Bro. Bezalel Tegi, who passed away early in 2017. Victor was able to be Bro. Peter's guide for the conference meetings and around Jerusalem. We thank the Lord that Pst. Peter was then prayerfully dedicated to fill the position and has aptly taken on his responsibilities, after returning home to PNG.

Then, an unexpected medical attack arose with Victor just a few days before we were to leave Israel. Due to severe back and chest pain, a nearby medical center cleared him of any cardiac concern. Yet, two days later, he broke out in a nasty rash of shingles on the left side of his back. It has now been 6 months since this first appeared, with more shingles symptoms following. Fatigue and some short-term memory loss continues. We need ongoing prayer for total healing.



Another unexpected event came up in October. The ICEJ leaders had selected Victor to receive the annual prestigious Nehemiah Award for 2017, for his past outreach to the Pacific Island nations to prayerfully stand with Israel across the South Pacific against anti-Semitism and voting bias in the Middle East and beyond. We were humbled, yet simultaneously greatly blessed, to receive the award. However, it meant we had to go back to Jerusalem for the October Conference to receive the recognition.

With the shingles still active in Victor's system, it wasn't easy for us to return to Israel, but the Lord enabled us and made the impossible—possible! It was so moving to see 3000 of our own Pacific Islanders among 90 other nations attending the huge 2017 ICEJ Event, of some 6000 participants! We give Him all honor & praise, as He alone is worthy and we have been only willing servants.

Shortly following, we were already back in Cairns when Pres. Trump made the eternal Declaration that Israel (i.e., Jerusalem) is Jewish, period. To the ire of the Palestinian masses who cried foul to the UN, this led to a poll of 128 nations, who either abstained or voted against the Trump declaration, not to mention the Bible! However, nine nations specifically voted for Israel, including the US and Israel proper, plus seven other SPIM-connected Pacific nations that had our finger prints all over them! THANK YOU, FATHER! See 1 Kings 11:32-36.

In December, we celebrated Hanukkah in remembrance of the cleansing of the temple by the Maccabees and the miracle of oil for the menorah that was only enough for one day, but lasted for eight days! Also, we rejoiced in celebrating the birth of our Messiah, and are eagerly looking for His second coming—we can hardly wait!

This year, our family was stretched around the globe from the Philippines, Brazil, USA, & Israel, with us in Australia. Even though separated by miles, we rejoice that our family is committed to serving the Almighty!

Thank you for your prayer support and gifts this past year. We are rejoicing for recent revival in the area in PNG where we ministered for many years. We think of the verse that says, "...one plants, another waters but God gives the increase." As you have shared with us in ministry, may you also rejoice with us in the ongoing harvest. We have had to cut back on some ministry, but we want to have open spirits and minds to know how we can still be used as His servants.

Foundation Corner
