QUARTERLY THEME: Marks of a Christian

TOPIC: HUMILITY

INTRODUCTION:

True humility is esteeming others better than ourselves (Philippians 2:3). If we put God first, others next and ourselves last, will we be in danger of exalting ourselves? But how very fleshly it is to always think of ourselves first. Perhaps we don't show this preference, but our inmost thoughts and motives are for self. This is just as wrong as if we would exalt ourselves publicly as the Pharisee who prayed in the temple.

Our motive in life should be to become Christ-like. His instruction to us is "take my yoke upon you; and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart" (Matthew 11:29) If Christ, who is our Lord and Master is meek and lowly, how much more so should we, His servants, be?

CENTRAL TRUTH: Self-exaltation brings eventual humbling; self-humbling brings true exaltation.

GOLDEN TEXT: WHOSOEVER EXALTETH HIMSELF SHALL BE ABASED; AND HE THAT HUMBLETH HIMSELF SHALL BE EXALTED.
Luke 14:11

Throughout history in God's dealing with man, we see the truth of these words of Jesus. At the very first, we see Satan appealing to the inherent pride of Eve, "and ye shall be as gods." (Genesis 3:5) After this self-exaltation came the humbling as our first parents lost paradise and their fellowship with God. King Saul, when he was chosen for anointing, humbled himself and was exalted. Later he exalted himself and was humbled.

The basic truth is that unless man is humbled, he cannot see the need of salvation, he cannot realize his lost estate. In his pride, he still feels himself as a god, the master of his fate, trusting in himself. This attitude must be changed. Man must be humbled so that God can lift him up. Why should we glory in the flesh, which is condemned to death through sin?

We should rather follow the example of Jesus, "being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Wherefore, God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a Name which is above every name." (Philippians 2:8-9)
