

New Missionaries

Paraguay (South America)

Gabriel and Hadassa Caballero are a "triple culture" couple. Gabe was born in Paraguay and received his American citizenship from his mother, and Hadassa is Brazilian. They met in the USA during a Bible School program and have been married for three years now. They have a one year old boy, Oliver, and together they are serving as missionaries in Paraguay. Gabriel is the leader of the Youth Ministry and the Worship group. The work with the young people happens through small groups during the week, Bible Studies, and a great Youth Service on Saturday nights. Hadassa is the coordinator of the Social Project "School of Life" that serves children from 6 to 14 years old, with the purpose of restoring their integrity and well-being, providing opportunities for integral growth (intellectual, academic, moral, physical and spiritual) and giving them a future and hope. Their greater testimony is that God has called them to give their lives to

follow His purposes at such a young age, and by saying "YES", they are able to be used by God to serve His Kingdom and make a difference in this generation.

Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on Me through their word; That they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that Thou hast sent Me. John 17:20-21

The night before Jesus was crucified, He shared a final meal together with His disciples. Before the meal, Jesus showed His love for them by washing their feet. Then He gave them "a new commandment,"- "Love one another as I have loved you," so that the world would know that they were His disciples.

After the meal, He prayed for them. But He didn't pray for them alone. He also prayed for those who would believe in Him through their word- He prayed for us. What was His prayer? What was- and is- most important to Him?

Jesus prayed that His Apostles and all those who would believe in Him through their word would be one, the same as He and the Father are One. That oneness is closer than anything we experience in normal human relationships. It shows the world that Jesus was sent by the Father.

The supernatural love of the disciples of Jesus Christ for one another is evidence to the world that we are His disciples. The resulting supernatural oneness of Believers is evidence that Jesus was sent to earth by our heavenly Father.

Who are we as His disciples to have this supernatural oneness with? In Ephesians 4: 1-6 Paul writes from prison:

I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called, With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; Endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, One God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all.

One body- One Spirit- One hope- One Lord- One faith- One baptism- One God and Father, Who is above all, and through all, and in you all. Our oneness with all of the varied members of His Body is evidence to the world that we are Jesus' disciples and that He was sent to the earth by our heavenly Father. Jesus prayed for this and the Father will grant this prayer.

We should make absolutely certain that we are cooperating with Him.

Paraguay

(South America)

Hello from Paraguay

We are all fine after quarantine, lock down and everything. As of August

1st, there are 5338 confirmed cases, 49 deaths and 3548 recovered in a total population of 7,132,538. The first two months were a complete stand still and we were privileged to have toucans visit our house many times during those first months. It seems like the quietness of the quarantine brought nature back to life. Now, noisy buses and cars are heard in the distance and there is movement and busy-ness

again.

All of a sudden, school was online, homework was handed in virtually, and Zoom classes and Google docs became a daily normal.

Church services were also cancelled. The younger ones figured out social media and online services, but kids' activities were all postponed, so we kept active through

social media.

Now we are in stage four. We are allowed to have services with 20 people present, all documented, temperature taken and hands washed before entering. We have youth services on

Saturday nights and Sunday morning services. Both services are streamed online from our Facebook page.

We are also allowed to have small groups of children meeting, with parental consent and correct documentation. So, as an extension of our Escuela de Vida project, we are having small cell groups Monday to Friday, for 2 hours.

Each group has two volunteers and not more than 10 kids, mostly the same age. The classes are structured similar to Sunday School or VBS classes: Praise and Worship, lessons, snacks and then games (or jumping on a trampoline that was donated to us).

We had several collections of food, clothes and money donations to help out those in need in our neighborhood, as well as selling and serving chicken dinners to help raise funds for one of our members, a cancer patient, and another one needing hip surgery.

Stage three of the Pandemic opened up construction and

we were able to start the construction at the back of the church. The first floor will be an auditoriumtype room for our kids, and



the upstairs will eventually be for classrooms. We were able to build up to the ceiling of the main floor with donations that were sent during 2019. Construction is on hold now because of lack of funds. Any donations coming in will be

used to fix up the lower auditorium in order to use it for our kids' ministries.

Thank you once again for praying for us and for

the ministries God designed for us here in Paraguay. We are thankful for each and every one of you who have helped us along the way through prayers, encouragement and donations.

(Brazil)

Dear Friends,

We hope you are all doing well during this pandemic. Here, we remain under quarantine; all adults are working in masks

and the children continue to have no contact with outsiders, except for video calls. One of our boys, Pedro, developed flu symptoms and we had to contact the pediatrician. She believed he had Covid-19 and placed him under complete isolation for 8 days until the test could be done to confirm whether or not he actually had the virus. We praise God that the test was negative and Pedro is doing much better now.



In our last update, we asked for prayer for one of our



caretakers, Sergio, since his toe had to be amputated after stepping on a nail back in January. Unfortunately, due to the need to care for Sergio and accompanying him to the various doctor's appointments and treatments, Cleonice, his wife, and another caretaker, resigned, and Sergio will also not be returning to work here at the home. We are grateful for the time they worked here and also praise the Lord for His quick provision of a new caretaker. At the beginning of July, we hired Max, 33

the neighboring city of Campo Belo. Max is adapting well and we are grateful to have him as part of our team. Please pray for Max as he builds relationships with the

boys and shows them the love of our Father each day.

Due to the pandemic, some of our workers have had to be temporarily suspended from their duties to avoid

people coming in from town to the home. One of these is João Lincon, our gardener and maintenance man for more than 30 years. In his absence, the boys have been working with Heltton to care for the garden. They are transforming the



organic garden into an agroforestry system. This system involves planting trees around crops and has varied benefits, including increased biodiversity and reduced erosion. As part of this



project, the boys plant a new crop every week and are looking forward to enjoying the fruits of their labor.

The home received a specific donation for the purchase of a tractor to help with the farm work. We are grateful to have found a good, used tractor to buy. The coffee harvest has



begun and the tractor is already being put to good use, both with the harvest and in the garden project.

The home strives to keep costs down by raising our own pigs, cattle, and chickens for consumption, and also to sell to local farmers. We use the crops from the garden in our daily food preparation as well. The sale of our coffee also helps with our budget, but the majority of our funding comes from your donations. Since the pandemic began, we have seen a decrease in monthly support. We trust in God's faithfulness to continue to provide for our needs and ask that you prayerfully consider a one-time donation to help offset this deficit.

Thank you for your prayers and financial contributions on behalf of this ministry. We praise God for you!

Ghana

THE FAITH HOSPITAL: The falling attendance at the hospital has started to reverse. The staff remain in high spirits and we thank God for their lives. The hospital has purchased,

on credit, some equipment (hormone analyser and fully automated analyser) for the medical laboratory. This is to enhance investigations on hormones and chemistry and stop samples being taken to



laboratories outside, who make high charges on the hospital.

THE CHURCHES AND THE HEADQUARTERS: Church services are still limited, in line with the social distancing discipline. We thank God that we are able to worship in church. Attendance at services in all the branches has remained low, mainly due to fear. There is a need to further support our pastors during these difficult times. Follow-up of church members has been intensified and the Word of God is still being sent out to members through electronic media. Our

radio programs in the local language have also been very beneficial. We thank the Lord for the opportunity to be in touch with our Members and to evangelise in these difficult times.

AWOSHIE CHURCH: The extensive damage caused by a rainstorm two months ago has been repaired. The gutter has been enlarged and the foundation near the gate has been strengthened. The gate was also removed and strengthened. The repairs have made the structure safe for use again.

The ADABRAKA CHURCH: The Mission was taken to court last year regarding land on which the Adabraka Church is built. Judgement was given in June of this year. Unfortunately, the Mission lost the case because the court felt we bought the land from someone who did not have the competence to sell the land. Since the judgement, we have gone into negotiations with the other party, with an intent to lease or rent the land.

We continue to pray that the grace and mercies of God may save the world from this dreaded virus.

(Brazil)

Greetings from Green Olive Tree Ministries

Fall. A wonderful time of the year that annually fades out the frequent rains of our region of Brazil and the heat and stickiness of Western Pennsylvania, making both geographical spots pleasant, climate wise. A perfect weather time to visit either place! We like fall.

Since the spring newsletter, and after many seasons of wondering, hoping, planning, deleting and re-planning, the Lord has moved some barriers and made clear that



it is time to take some forward steps. This fall is scripted to bring about a major transition in the structure of GOTM. As this newsletter is being penned, the team at Lebenshaus ("House of Life") is busy with all the details of the reallocation of dwelling places, duties, and responsibilities, as Brent turns over the day-to-day workings of the central ministries of the mission- giving them to the charge of our faithful coworkers.

Preparations are being made for Brent to work, mostly remotely, from Pennsylvania.

Daniel Salgado has been voted in as the new President of Missão Oliveira Verde. He has made the decision to move his family onto the Lebenshaus property and actively superintend the daily life and ministries of GOTM. Daniel first came to our acquaintance about 12 years ago. He was a believer in search

of deeper Bible teaching and discipleship. He gradually became an integral part of our local Church. He has lead community Bible studies for many years and is a chief programmer for the GOTM Bible camps and retreats held throughout the year. Daniel

has accounting experience, having worked on the business end of his uncle's plant and flower business in the past. He hopes to develop his own plant business on the Lebenshaus property to support his family. He married Evaneides in 2017, and they now have a two year old daughter, Elisa.

Aldido ("Dido") and Sara are a couple who have been a part of the GOTM ministry since our beginnings in Pombos. Sara came to the Lord through the Pombos School's ministry to parents of students. Dido followed several years later. They have served the work in various capacities through the years. Sara filled multiple functions in the Pombos school - cook,

housekeeping, child care for teachers, after school care for young students, teacher's helper, etc. She has also had a valuable role in helping us to love

our own family members. Dido has done grounds work and caretaking for the mission properties. As a couple they have provided caregiving for our children when Brent has come to the US to visit Debbie. They made the move to the Lebenshaus property about six years ago. Sara helps with the care of the family house and assists the kids with meal preparation while Debbie has been in the US. Dido has helped manage the extensive

farm work of the Lebenshaus property. Recently they have expressed that they love our children like their own, have grown to understand them and their peculiarities, and feel ready to assume a greater role in their lives. They have offered to take our daughter, Fabiana, into their own home and under their loving care. They will also oversee the well being of our sons. Dido and Sara have 2 children: Sandrely, living in her own home, and Esequiel, age 14.

The youngest of our children still in Brazil will turn eighteen years old on August 19. The importance of this landmark is that it relieves us of direct <u>legal</u> responsibility for our children. We cannot be accused of abandonment by leaving the country. Also, the substitute caregivers are free from legal ramifications as well. That factor, plus the Lord's work in the hearts of our Brazilian team members, has opened the door for Brent to be reunited with Debbie on US soil. We

had hoped that the United States would have approved our request for our legally adopted children to come to the US by now, but such is not the case. Our children have all reached adulthood during the decade long wait for bureaucracy in both countries to lumber along. It has now been in the hands of the US Immigration Service for the past 40 months.

In Pennsylvania, our 13 year old son is greatly looking forward to having a father's hand in the home to guide him in a manly way through his teenage years. The girls, who are taught to always reply, "you'll have to talk to my Dad", are pleased that his wisdom and guidance and care will be close at hand. And Mom? . We are thrilled that the progress in the health of Karah continues to go forward. Some lifelong residual issues remain, but she is grabbing hold of the present opportunities, grateful for each one. The transition of the work of GOTM in Brazil from the day-to-day leadership of North American missionary hands to...

the hands of Brazilian believers is finally happening. It is something that we have hoped and prayed for over the many years of the development of the work. What was begun many decades ago has evolved into a continuing, lifelong work. Not just the lifetime of its founders, but the lifetimes of those who have joined in and are continuing in the process of being persons caring for and growing persons into the fullness that is in Christ.

We ask that you pray for;

- The Leadership: pray for the two couples- Daniel & Evaneides, Dido & Sara- that they would have Unity in direction, Courage in action, Faithfulness in purpose.
- The "Un-Orphanage": We have fought long and hard to give the children whom the Lord brought over the years to the "Lar Missão Oliveira Verde" (GOTM Home) a chance to be settled in permanent families. Many were settled in ours. Our sons and daughter remaining in Brazil are looking at a huge transition. Although no longer minors, they have a continuing need for parental involvement. One has two more years of high school to complete. Four have intellectual disabilities and/or psychological dysfunction. One is blind. All are rescued from early abuse and dysfunctional families and still bear the scars.

A repeat of loosing the security of family structure, now to be without both parents, may provoke additional trauma. Only two have a verbalized



commitment to the Lord. Pray that our remote parenting of them will be consistent, strong and insightful. Pray that the Lord would make Himself fully known to them. Pray that the substitute care givers will have Godly wisdom and patience. Pray that we will daily entrust them, and ourselves, to the Lord's care.

- The Church: Daniel will be assuming the majority of the Sunday teaching. Those meetings are attended by a group of neighborhood young men. Pray for their salvation. Pray for the area couples who frequent the worship services, that they would become integral to the body.
- The camps: The Lebenshaus property was designed for a type of outreach that brings people in.
 During the year, camps are held for Bible teaching, fellowship and refreshment for both saved and unsaved people.
- The community outreach: various home Bible studies, cooperation with the agricultural community, helping a neighbor in need, emergency shelter or transport are ways that GOTM seeks to reach out to the community.
- The Lebenshaus Farm Projects: small animals,

flowers and plant cultivation, fish ponds, etc are used for the multi-purpose of providing some income for the mission and providing safe, healthy, productive work experiences for those who remain in the care of the mission, and also as teaching opportunities in the community.

• *Visas:* Please continue to pray that the long-awaited US immigration visas will be granted.

Needs:

- We are seeking to develop an internet communication system allowing better regular contact between Pennsylvania and Brazil. We will need to assist our son in his schooling (he studies in English via correspondence school), Brent hopes to continue mentoring the leaders in Bible teaching and we hope to frequently interact (as a family) with our sons and daughter.
- Continued financial support for the mission. During our time in Brazil we tried to adhere to a George Mueller philosophy: Quietly ask the Lord and He will fund His will. The lean times were growing times, His grace abundant, His care masterful. The bountiful times were refreshing and made so clear His blessing on our human plans. We desire the same for the new team. So, we pray for open hearts listening to the leading of the Lord, both for the team and for the Church at home.

"But I am like a Green Olive tree planted in the house of the Lord. I will trust in the mercies of the Lord forever and ever.

I will praise You forever because You have done it. I will wait on Your name - for it is good - in the presence of Your saints." (Psalm 52:8, 9)

children have had many good, solid months of shelter from the outside elements and temptations, and have been able



We are learning this from these precious souls. One of the children, who suffered great abuse by his father and who saw his sister murdered before his eyes, recently shared he wanted to stay in the safety of MP (Manos Pequeños) forever. However, even more so, he wanted for his sibling to



experience this security and said, "If only one of us leaves, I want my sibling to stay behind because I know he will always have safety here, and food to eat at every meal." This young child, so uncertain of

his future, and knowing the days may come again where he has nothing to eat when he leaves, is so willing to give that

up for someone he loves. When the children share thoughts like this with us, it humbles us to no end... knowing our own selfishness, and many times, the petty things we may cry about or murmur to the Lord about.



May we learn to walk closer to God each day and learn the value in self-denial. What love

must fill the Savior when He looks down on us, and when He can see qualities similar to those of this little boy. May we each grow in grace, humility, and love for our neighbor, as

this little one has taught us.



We thank each of you for giving us the opportunity to be a shelter to these little ones, and to learn first-hand from their experiences. God bless you each richly.

The whole world has been rocked by the events of the past few months and yet we see that people are not backing down from supporting those in

need. In fact, because of your support, we have been able to continue to feed each and every child, PLUS, the families are benefiting from the food packets that are being sent home. This is a huge deal. At the beginning of all of this all, I

remember panicking and thinking that all this feeding and taking caring of the orphans would fall apart, but that has not been the case. God has come through in ways beyond our expectation!! Although the school remains closed to most of the students, construction continues. Apart from a few details, the science classrooms (lab rooms) are almost completed. We are so thankful to Adrian Acs for being so diligent in seeing that these projects are done in a timely and

efficient manner. His wife Marce has been a great support to Adrian and to the ministry!

Speaking of construction, we are so pleased to announce that the vocational school is completed, and we will be welcoming the students who will be attending LVTC (Lifesong Vocational and Technical Centre) this August! We've mentioned before that this program is designed to help

prepare students (who wouldn't be going on to pursue academic studies) with the opportunity to learn a skill

or a trade. By the way... if you know of anyone who is an auto mechanic that feels that God is calling them on the mission field, please spread the word. We're looking for a teaching commitment of one year (or longer).



As the COVID numbers continue to rise in Zambia, the primary focus at this point is to comply with measures to keep the students and staff healthy and safe. That is why we have decided to remain closed, with the exception of the examination classes (Grades 7 and 9) and the LVTC students meeting on the premises, for now. Please pray for Zambia and the ministry in general. Also, could we please entreat you to keep our family in prayer as we prepare to head back to Zambia.

Although the situation in the world right now looks grim, and sometimes hopeless, we are so blessed that we have a God who loves and takes care of His children everywhere.

We are so thankful that God has continued to allow support to reach Zambia so that Lifesong can continue to bring hope to the orphaned and vulnerable. Thank you for obeying God's call to support those in need,



especially during a time of crisis. Your love and giving will not go unnoticed, especially by the children in Zambia who are being taken care of in a time like this.

Canaan Land Ministries

(Brazil)

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

God is in the business of changing lives at Canaan Land Ministry (CLM). We believe He sends kids here because He has a special plan for the future of each one. He is using the CLM team to give them hope. We appreciate you taking the time to learn more about the work at CLM and support us in prayer!

<u>Hope Restored:</u> We praise God for the ways he is transforming lives through CLM. We are preparing to send off two young ladies within the next week or so.

Mirian and Abymael: Mirian (26) is a mother of three who separated from her husband due to his violence. Her two daughters are in a government group home. Mirian and her

two-day-old son Abymael came to CLM at the end of last year. We are thankful that the courts allowed her to stay at CLM with Abymael until a decision could be made about whether she would be allowed to care for him on her own.

At CLM, Mirian has shown responsibility and cooperation in all areas. Her presence has been a blessing. In July, Abymael was officially released to her care. We are looking for an apartment for her in Guarapuava, and will continue to help her

with expenses until she can get a job and sustain herself.

Mirian has enrolled to continue her high school education through distance learning, starting in August. Our prayer is that she can get back on her feet and receive her daughters once again. Please pray with us.

Patricia: Patricia has been at CLM since late 2017, when she arrived at the age of 16. We are very thankful for the transformation in her life. The first time she went back to school, after arriving at CLM, she ended up returning to her previous issues and was then hospitalized in a rehabilitation clinic.

Upon her return to CLM, Patricia continued struggling but started taking on a different mentality. She began seeing us as her supporters, not her enemy. Patricia is very cooperative, helping willingly with anything that needs to be done. She is calm and gets along well with everyone, which is a big change from before.

Patricia is a baptized Christian and has been growing spiritually. She is concerned about her future and wants to get a job and start the process of acquiring independence. After repeated visits with her parents, Patricia has decided it is time to go live with them. Please be praying for her as she adapts, that she will be able to continue strong in the Lord and maintain the progress she has made.



<u>Pandemic Update:</u> Things have not changed much with Coronavirus in our region in the last three months. Schools and churches are still closed, and businesses are operating with masks and social distancing. The CLM kids are receiving all their schoolwork through bi-weekly document pickups at their schools.

The main difference at CLM is that with the increase to over 400 cases in Guarapuava, we have taken a few more precautions. The office staff that does not live at CLM is working from home, coming to the farm only when absolutely necessary. We hope, in this way, to protect the CLM kids and caregivers from transmission as much as possible.

<u>Middle School Graduates</u>: Many children and teens arrive at CLM after years without going to school. We then have the task of teaching them the value of learning and helping them catch up to their peers, as much as possible.

Willian (16) and Patricia (18) were participating in special classes for older students who need to finish middle school. Both were able to complete their studies at the end of this semester. They are now ready to start high school in August.

Solar Energy Project: The electric bill at CLM has always been one of our largest monthly expenses. For years, we have been searching for ways to cut costs in this area. Recently, we were given the opportunity to consider the installation of solar panels (appropriate for the climate here) that would generate electric energy and reduce costs.

The solar panels are to be installed on an overhang on the front of the main building that will also serve as a covered parking area for the office. The roof structure is in place, as of the end of July, so we are just waiting on the panels and connection to the power grid. Thanks to a loan from the ACCMBC, we will be able to pay for this project gradually, instead of needing the whole amount at once.

New Car: On July 23rd, CLM received a new car through the City of Guarapuava. It is a five-passenger Citroen Aircross. The city obtained this vehicle through an agreement with

state and federal government agencies. CLM was granted permission to use the vehicle

for five years.


