# Green Olive Tree Ministries

Brazil

Dear Ones in Christ,

First we would like to express our deep appreciation for the opportunities to travel to the AC Church camps this past month. We were encouraged, refreshed and challenged by the teachings and forums, by the interactions with so many that we have come to know through the years, and by the new acquaintances made who are of like mind. The world over, the Family of Christ is dear indeed.

At Lebenshaus, in Brazil, daily tasks continue as we wait on the Lord to show the way He has for the Ministry. The property remains on the market- with no action to speak of. As we read recently, "Prayer exists to align us to God's will, not to inform Him of ours" (Melissa Spoelstra, from her study book, Isaiah). And so we pray that the Lord's will be made clear in this matter.

In another recent devotional, we were encouraged through the story of Elisha and the widow and the little jar of oil, to look at what the Lord has already given us that we may be overlooking. In answer to the widow's plea, Elisha asked her, "what do you have in the house?" The writer of the devotional goes on to say, "What do you have in your house, within your reach? Sometimes we wait impatiently on God when He is waiting patiently on us, waiting for us to recognize what He has already given as part of the answer to our problem. What little pot of oil have you neglected to notice? What little shred of possibility have you chosen to ignore? What little patch of time have you disparaged? What little hints of blessing have you criticized as insufficient? What little, humble beginnings have you shoved to the back shelf, considering them unworthy of being the basis for God's miraculous intentions?" (Awaken, Priscilla Shirer, p. 8)

Are the Divine interruptions to our personal life and ministry over the past decade a patch of time to be disparaged? Are they an indication to shove what has gone before to the

back shelf? Are the past 35 years of humble beginnings unworthy of God's miraculous intentions?

We may have thought so at our lowest emotional ebbs, when separation and more-to-do-than-seemingly-possible moments hit. But we know there has always been the undercurrent of God's sustaining grace and love that keeps His flame flickering. And so, we now



prayerfully look at what is already in the house - Lebenshaus - house of life.

- the little pot of oil: A new daughterin-law who has brought her zeal and talents and connections to meet needs of her siblings-in-law and the ministry. After her willingness to take on the care of our special needs daughter by welcoming her into their newly established home, Milka was able to meet the challenge of Fabiana's need for eye surgery. Milka's years of working in her sister's ocular stores gave her the contacts to arrange an excellent doctor to perform artificial lens replacement

in treatment of Fabiana's bilateral congenital cataracts. Her first surgery was July 28. Fabiana has many physical and intellectual challenges. Her level of understanding provokes in her a fearfulness of - much! We pray for the Lord's gentle guidance of her through these days.

disabilities needing a life-long home and care system.

We recently received a special donation to help with the




construction of a covered parking lot in front of the home and to install security cameras on the grounds. We are so thankful that these much needed projects were able to be completed and praise God for His provision of funds.

PARAGUAY MISSIONS: "ESCUELA DE VIDA"

Time is flying! Half of the year is gone, and now we are starting the second semester

of "Escuela de Vida" (School of Life) As the coordinator of the project, I had the privilege to participate in the Missionary Conference that happened during Eastern Camp. It was an amazing opportunity to share what God is doing in our midst. For those who didn't have the chance to hear our presentation, I would like to share a little bit about our mission and how you can be part of this great project that is

reaching out to many children and giving them the opportunity to hear the truths of God and His Word.

The project's mission is to create opportunities for children and teenagers at social risk to acquire skills and competencies to develop



their potential, so that they become Christian leaders in our nation. "Escuela de Vida", due to its complexity and wealth of Christian principles, reaches and transforms many groups of people:

- CHILDREN & TEENS: Our main audience is children and teenagers at social risk, the age group between six to twelve years old, middle school students. Our goal is to offer them leadership development with Christian character, restoring their integrity and well-being, providing opportunities for integral growth (intellectual, academic, moral, physical and spiritual), giving them future and hope.
- 2. FAMILIES: Through each child and teenager, our goal is to reach their families with the Christian ethical concepts of relationship, restoring family values, turning the hearts of parents to children and restoring the position of parents as primary educators of their children.
- 3. VOLUNTEERS: With a curriculum based on education by Christian principles, Escuela de Vida equips a generation of educators, intercessors, counselors and everyone who works on the project. Our vision and concepts are transformed together with the students.
- 4. COMMUNITY: Escuela de Vida is present in the child's



life- in their neighborhood, school, and family. Our goal is to offer them possibilities of growth for their life, so the team interacts regularly and weekly with orientations, services and donations in the communities,

transforming the environment in which they live.

5. SUPPORTERS AND SPONSORS: They are more than just

partners in the supply of resources, they are transforming agents. Our supporters are sensitive to the objectives our mission and are key to the resulting behavioral transformations. Involved in the life of the community, the sponsors live the same Christian principles and promote the development of Escuela de Vida directly.

Classes are held at the church property, in San Antonio. The classes are on Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 2:00 pm to 5:30 pm and include English, Literature, Arts, Physical Education and Bible classes. Snacks, Bibles, t-shirts, as well as all the

materials, are provided for the kids. Our group of teachers is made up of volunteers from our Church, people who have made available their time and resources to invest heavily in this work.



### WHAT'S NEXT?

For the first time in Paraguay, we are expanding "Escuela de Vida" to a city called Ypane, 45 minutes away from our location. At the beginning of the year, we started a small group at Mrs. Carolina's house, a faithful Sister in the Church. The group is divided into adults', teenagers' and children's life groups. Mrs. Emilia and her husband, Nestor, are the leaders of the group. She reached out to us with a dream to open "Escuela de Vida" around the neighborhood where they meet for the small group. After praying and organizing all the details, we are happy to share that we will be starting the classes on August 17th and the volunteer group already has over 10 people involved. Most of them are adults that started coming to the small group and now have decided to serve the Lord in this project. We cannot wait to see what God has prepared for the new extension of "Escuela de Vida". Our hope and faith is that as we reach these children and teenagers, we are creating opportunities with God to change the direction of many lives.

### HOW CAN YOU HELP OUR MISSION?

- 1. Praying daily for the missionaries and for all the work they are doing in Paraguay.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Thank you so much for faithfully lifting this ministry in prayer. The last few months have been very busy, with many new children arriving:

### **Numbers Up**

At this time last year, we had less than 15 children and teens. Now we have 23! We've mostly been receiving older teens (many with a history of drug use) or groups of 3 to 5 siblings.

We depend on your prayers, as we need much wisdom to guide them all daily.

### **Staff Changes**

In June, social worker, Tiene, moved on to a new position in the local schools. Elis (pictured) came to take her place. She is excited to be on the team and is working on getting to know everyone and how things work at CLM.



Caregivers, Vagner and Analu, ended their time at CLM in May, and just a few days ago, started their journey to Mozambique where they will be serving as missionaries. In June, we received a new caregiver couple, Gleison and



Mayara, from Sao Paulo. They heard about CLM through former caregivers Jurandir and Luana. Pray for Gleison and Mayara and their sons Gabriel (10) and Nathan (5) as they adapt at CLM. They are

pictured with the 5 CLM children that were living with them in July.

### **Changes to the Bylaws and New Board Member**

CLM now has a new position of Internal Director, meaning the person in charge of administering CLM on a daily basis is no longer part of the board of directors. Anderson Kasnocha left his position as president of the board to continue as Internal Director, so we needed to restructure the board. Juan is now the president, Junior continues as vice-president, and Felipe moved to the treasurer spot. Former caregiver, Jurandir, is now a member of the board, serving as the secretary.

CLM's lawyer has been instrumental in drawing up the changes to the bylaws, as well as many other internal documents that help structure operating procedures. Please pray for him as he continues serving CLM in this capacity.

### **Trips to the United States**

Two families from CLM were able to travel to the missionary retreat and Eastern Camp this July. We were thankful to be able to meet with many of you and share what God is doing at CLM. Juan, Bethany and Caleb Villalba were in the States for 3 weeks in July, while Anderson, Dani, Joao and Heitor Kasnocha stayed from mid-July through early August. Retired CLM missionary Mary Gibson and her grandson Nicolas were also able to be in the U.S. during June and July. Thank the Lord and all of you who helped make these trips possible and blessed us in so many ways during our time stateside.

### **New Projects on the Horizon**

CLM is moving forward with 2 new ministry projects:

- 1. Foster care- Selecting and supervising foster families;
- 2. Battered women's shelter- Providing safe housing at the Turvo facility and assisting women in getting back on their feet after experiencing trauma.

Both projects are at the stage of getting registered with local governments, and will probably take several months to get up and running. We covet your prayers as we seek God's guidance for these new opportunities.


Johnny Yorga shared some practical tips from his job as a counsellor. He challenged us to show empathy and to

# Missionary Conference

Eastern Camp

The theme of Eastern Camp 2022 was beautifully timed. The theme was "Revive Us Again". This comes from Psalm 85 verse 6, "Wilt thou not revive us again: that Thy people may rejoice in Thee?" Revive means "to return



to consciousness of life." After a two-year hiatus, it was an exhaustingly full week that our hearts needed. We were together again.

As a returning camper, walking in for registration and then back into our sanctuary that opening Sunday night brought on an emotional moment of reflection. Seeing loved ones from near and far gathering to worship and praise our Lord



and Savior Jesus Christ had an awe-inspiring power reverberating off the walls of Lehman Hall.

Two years of being apart physically, made this camp an exhilarating reuniting of Believers.

For new campers and old campers alike, we all fell into the camp routine easily. The familiarity of the campus and the camp schedule didn't deter attendance for any part of the schedule. The theme, class lessons and forum topics were on point and relevant to hearts of young and old. Kudos was given to the camp staff for keeping a full schedule on time throughout the week,

for keeping a full schedule on time throughout the week, especially during the longer days of Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Bro. Adrian Webel eloquently spoke at the after camp wrap up in Mansfield about one of our lessons about Jonah:

Jonah is a familiar story to those who have grown up attending church. God calls Jonah to deliver a dire message to the city of Nineveh because they are so evil. Jonah is NOT on board with this plan (the Ninevites were the Jews' enemies) and gets on a ship going the opposite direction.

But God convinces Jonah, He really does want him to deliver that message. (God does this using a storm, the sea, and a large fish.) When Jonah finally gets to Nineveh, he delivers God's message in chapter 3 verse 4, "And Jonah



began to enter into the city a day's journey, and he cried, and said, Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown."

And from these simple few words, the people of the city believed God, and turned from their wicked ways. They didn't even have a promise that they would be saved- but repented and changed, hoping for God's

mercy. So, the first lesson is that the Word of God (or Jesus who wrote the Word) has to be that trigger for revival. Now

a second lesson comes from why Jonah didn't want to preach there. We learn in the last chapter that Jonah is NOT happy that Nineveh is saved. They are Israel's enemy. And Jonah knew that God would spare them because he knew God is slow to anger and wanting to forgive. But now God must show



Jonah that He loves even people who are

living in spiritual darkness. The message of God's judgement, and His love and mercy needs to go to everyone: those we love AND those we consider unlovable.

This may be my favorite part of Eastern Camp. The part where I get to learn and grow with other Believers on topics and

stories that I've heard since my childhood. I will confess that when I initially saw the topic of Jonah, I casually dismissed it mentally as it is a story I've heard many times before. Yet God's message is always relevant and applicable, and this

message, especially, was on my heart.

Eastern Camp has a way of shining through all year long. From friends traveling and gathering on the weekends, camp choir songs being sung in homes, churches or vehicles throughout the year, to forums and sermons being listened to over and over again thanks to our camp website and audio department. It is



one week that is a sanctuary to hundreds yet brings joy to so many more the whole year through.

# Midwest Camp

Indiana

Got Fruit? That was the question we heard over and over this

year at Midwest Camp in Lake Placid, Hartfort City, Indiana.

Our theme was the Fruit of the Spirit, from Galatians chapter 5. We spent two days reviewing the book of Galatians, with emphasis on chapter 5. The rest of our lesson time was



spent studying each aspect of the fruit mentioned. It was interesting to learn that the first three are love, joy, and peace - one syllable; then patience, kindness, and goodness - two syllables; and finally faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control - three syllables.

We discussed each of these in great detail, including: a definition; what is the opposite; what does it look like; and how can we grow in it--while always remembering it is the



fruit of the **Spirit**. These are not traits that we can develop by our own hard work--it is the work of the Holy Spirit.

Our morning classes were followed by small group sessions, with questions designed to help us apply

what we learned very personally. In the small group setting, we were able to more fully explore our own successes and failures, and seek for ways to exhibit the fruit to a dying and confused world.

Our sermons during the week focused on the fact that there really is one fruit with many facets. Different Brothers during the week preached from various scriptures, always



with a focus on one of the facets we were learning about during the morning classes. As the week progressed, we heard: fruit is evidence of being connected to God; Jesus, exhausted from teaching all day, was able to be completely at peace and sleep through a terrible storm at sea; God is the ultimate standard of good- He alone is good; when we face difficulties, what is our focus? Do we turn to Jesus/God, or somewhere else?; and how important it is to keep our eyes on the prize. Do we really want to win the race, or are we just coasting?

Our afternoons, in warm, humid Indiana, were spent in a variety of games, discussions, visiting, and personal reflection. Lake Placid is itself located on about 100 acres of beautiful Indiana country. You will travel by many corn and soybean fields on your journey. The Lake itself lives up to its name - Placid. It is very calm, and there are always lovely reflections to enjoy. The Lake is also stocked, enabling us to have a fishing contest while there.



For those interested, Midwest Camp has been held in Lake Wawasee in Syracuse, Indiana; in Huntington, Indiana at Huntington College; at Camp FaHoLo, Grass Lake, Michigan, and now, here in Lake Placid, Hartfort

City, Indiana. This year we were 236 strong, with 43 kids 6th grade and under, 104 teens, and 89 adults. As you can see from these numbers, it is a very young camp. There is a lot of energy from these amazing young people - in the music, the study of God's Word, the afternoon activity, and the teen worship. It is so encouring to see that the next generations are building a strong foundation based on God Himself.

Have you been to Midwest Camp? When was the last time? You would be very welcome and would grow in the Lord as a result. Got Fruit? Want more Fruit? Only through the Holy Spirit!

- 2. We all need time to remember and reflect. As this world and culture continue to bombard us with their messages of "truth" and "value", we need the holiness (set apartness) of a day, to refresh our perspectives and realign our values to that which is important to our Heavenly




Father. Because in the end, what really matters is...
